NEW ROOFS ON THE COMMUNITY LEAGUE HALL

You may have noticed some repairs and maintenance happening at the community hall this past year. Work was started on the tar and gravel roof last August and new shingles were installed on the roof of the Preschool in February. Thanks to our maintenance volunteer, Lance, for overseeing these much needed repairs!

The community would also like to thank two funding sources for this project. The cost of the two roof replacements was \$71,500. We were fortunate to receive funding from the following grant programs:

I. CIIF- This funding is from a federal program called the <u>Community Infrastructure</u>

<u>Improvement Fund (CIIF)</u> and is offered through <u>Western Economic Diversification Canada</u>.

\$28,770 was awarded.



2. CLIP-This funding is from the City of Edmonton's Community League Infrastructure Program (CLIP). \$35,735 was awarded.

Repairs and updates to the exterior of the building are continuing this summer. Please consider purchasing a 2014 Community Membership in September. - nominate a Director who is willing to serve and stand in for or replace the President; as circumstances require;
- is a member of the Executive Committee;
- is a signing authority, and

The Secretary will:

- attend all meetings of the League, the Board, and the Executive Committee and keep accurate minutes of the same;
- be responsible for the minute and meeting notice distribution;
- have charge of minute book and other records;
- have charge of all correspondence of the League under the direction of the President and the Board;
- act as a signing authority;
- be a member of the Executive Committee; and
- have charge of the seal of the society.

In the absence of the Secretary, such officer as may be appointed by the Board will discharge these duties.

- be responsible for all matters pertaining to sports, including the registration and organization of soccer, etc.;
- recruit representatives or act as the representative to the sports governing bodies;
- prepare an annual budget for the sports programs and submit it to the Treasurer;
- review and prepare policy and procedures with respect to sports programs; and
- report monthly to the Board of Directors

The Newsletter Director will:

- be responsible for the publication of the newsletter and participate articles for the newsletter;
- oversee the delivery of the newsletter;
- be responsible for the maintenance of the League website;
- arrange for publicity for league events;
- prepare an annual budget for publicity and submit it to the Treasurer;
- review and prepare policy and procedures with respect to publicity; and
- report monthly to the Board of Directors

The Social Director will:

- be responsible for all matters pertaining to social activities of the League, including dances, social nights, etc.;
- prepare an annual budget for social activities and submit it to the Treasurer;
- review and prepare policy and procedures with respect to social activities; and
- report monthly to the Board of Directors

The Membership Director will:

- be responsible for the organization, timing and completion of the annual Membership campaign;
- keep a record of and maintain the membership lists and other records pertaining to membership;
- ensure compliance with the EFCL Code of Ethics with respect to selling memberships;
- prepare an annual budget for membership and submit it to the Treasurer;
- review and prepare policy and procedures with respect to membership; and
- report monthly to the Board of Directors.



Anyone who has a yard knows it as a fact of life: weeds don't give a damn about where my yard ends and yours begins. Weeds do not recognize invisible boundaries created by words or by fencing and good intentions. Llke any plant, be it flower or tree, weeds will grow wherever they can. That's nature at its best and its worst.

The very same holds true for food crops. No big surprise there, right? Well, recently this sort of uncontrollable expansion has become a very hot button issue, in the forum of GMOs, or genetically modified organisms.

The European Commission is recognized worldwide as having the most stringent regulations regarding GMOs in their food supplies. Here is how they define GMOs:

Genetically modified organisms (GMOs) are organisms, such as plants and animals, whose genetic characteristics are being modified artificially in order to give them a new property. Food and feed which contain or consist of such GMOs, or are produced from GMOs, are called genetically modified (GM) food or feed.

(source: http://ec.europa.eu/food/food/biotechnology/gmo_en.htm) (italics by me)

So, in short, any plants that have had their genes manipulated, or had genes from elsewhere injected into them, are considered GMOs.

And, for the record, the millenia—old art of crossbreeding plants to bear out desirable characteristics is NOT considered genetic modification under this definition. So, for any fans of the late, great Gregor Mendel, the 19th—century Czech monk whose study of hereditary traits in pea plants gave rise to the modern science of genetics, rest easy. He's still worthy of worship.

But—what does all this have to do with the price of potatoes?

As you've undoubtedly guessed, quite a lot.

Those who advocate in favour of GM foods say it allows farms to produce more with less. Plants grown from GM seeds are specifically bred to withstand

traditional blights like drought or pests or even viruses. Therefore, loss of yield to such hazards is reduced and the crop is bigger. Some also advocate GM foods in order to boost nutritional value at lower cost. An example of this is something called "Golden Rice," rice that's been genetically engineered to include beta-carotene, an A vitamin responsible for that beautiful orange colour in vegetables such as carrots and sweet potatoes. This GM rice gets its name from, you guessed it, its bright yellow colour. (Clearly, their marketers are on the ball: who'd want to eat something called "Yellow Rice?")

All right. So that all sounds pretty good, in terms of increasing food production for our ever growing global population. And, it might be—if you can guarantee safety for human consumption and sustainable farming practices.

But right now, at this moment, no one can make that guarantee.

One of the biggest concerns with GMOs for human consumption is the possibility of allergens. Scientists are introducing genes into vegetables and fruit that don't naturally occur in those foods. So, it's conceivable that a person with a peanut allergy could find himself having an allergic reaction to something other than peanuts, but which has had the same allergenic protein injected into it. Since he isn't expecting it, he may not be properly prepared when the reaction starts. This very possibility is why there's a big push for full disclosure of GMOs in food products. Labelling is the only way for us to know if we should be wary of unexpected allergens in a given food.

Another issue is related to what I mentioned at the start of this Corner: plants don't care where one farm ends and another starts. The winds don't care, either. Take, for example, the "StarLink Corn incident" in 2000, when corn products such as tortilla chips and taco shells were found to have small amounts of genetically-modified StarLink corn in them. StarLink seed was not approved for human consumption due to its allergenic potential. It was approved strictly for feed only. No one was hurt severely from eating the contaminated products and StarLink corn seed was taken off the market in 2001. However, this example highlights the impossibility of separating the GMOs from the non-GMOs. Those tortilla chips and taco shells weren't tested until people started getting sick.



2013 Outdoor Season a great success

Despite the rather late start to the season and the seemingly never ending cycle of cool, wet and windy weather, this was a great Outdoor Soccer season for the Rio Terrace Soccer Program. Rio Terrace fielded 15 teams and over 200 players for the 2013 Outdoor soccer season at the community U-8 through U-18 age groups — a level of activity that exceeded recent historical levels. With 4 U8 teams and 5 U10 teams, the Rio Terrace soccer program should continue to be busy for the next few years! Rio Terrace teams continued to enjoyed great growth and experience success during the Outdoor season.

The U-16 Girls team – with long time head coach Mark Mertens – had their very successful season capped off by winning the Gold medal in Calgary at the season ending at Group A Inter-City Championships.

The U-16 Boys – with long time head coach Sean Armstrong and manager Leslie Armstrong - had their very successful season capped off by earning a Bronze medal at the Tier 4 Provincial Championships. This team also won Gold at the City Championships and preceded that with winning Gold at the Slush Cup tournament.

The other Rio Terrace teams also had fine seasons with lots of great soccer and many victories – whether on the game sheet or not – along the way. Most of the Rio Terrace teams participated in the June Slurpee Cup tournament with great success and lots of fun.

The U6 Fun Soccer Program was also bursting at the seams this year with 6 teams and over 60 players. This inhouse program kept the Rio Terrace soccer fields busy and kept the parents, grandparents and others very entertained throughout the season. The season ended with the traditional bouncy house and team themed dinosaur Dairy Queen ice cream cakes and other treats.

We are very fortunate in Rio Terrace that we have so many dedicated soccer coaches and team managers who give their time, effort and expertise to make soccer a fun and rewarding experience for our youth. The whole community thanks you for all that you do with these young soccer players.

2013-2014 Indoor Soccer Registration

The registration sessions for the 2013-2014 Indoor Soccer season take place at the West Edmonton Soccer Centre (17415 – 106A Ave) on Sept 10 (Tuesday) & 12 (Thursday) from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM.

Players born in 1996 through 2006 are eligible to play youth soccer in the age groups U8 through U18. Younger players can also register at these sessions for the U4 – U6 programs that are ran by the Edmonton West Soccer Zone. The Indoor season will start in October and carries on through to the end of February. Teams play once a week with U8-U12 games on Saturdays and U14-U18 games on Sundays. Generally there is one practice a week.





HOW TO SAVE PEREGRINE FALCON

Glenn Kadlkak was hunting this spring on the sea ice off Falstaff Island in Hudson Bay when he came across an injured Peregrine Falcon. It had a broken wing. He knew it faced certain death if left on the ice. Glenn took the injured bird to Johanne Coutu-autut, the Conservation Officer in Rankin Inlet, where the falcon was fed, given export papers, and a free flight out of Nunavut to Edmonton by Canadian North airlines.

The falcon, (aka Falstaff) was taken to see Kim Blomme, Registered Animal Health Technologist at the Edmonton Wildlife Rehabilitation Centre. X-rays revealed the bones in the broken left wing could be set. Kim splinted and bandaged the wing and let him rest.

At Wild Birds Unlimited our customers met Falstaff on Jun 15 as part of a Father's Day "Peregrine Falcon in Store" event. He was brought by Dr. Gord Court of Alberta Sustainable Resource Development who is an expert in



According to Gord, "When all bandaging was finally removed, I placed him on a perch in front of a bath pan in my yard. He immediately jumped in and had the bath of his life." After further work on the wing Falstaff recovered to the point where he was flying up to the end of an 8 ft weathering leash all day long. "When he began breaking feathers," Gord says, "we knew it was time to go."

Gord and Alastair Franke, another peregrine researcher, took him out to Beaverhill Lake to see if he was ready to go. Alastair placed him on a hay bale, let him loose, and off he flew. He immediately headed into a strong west wind. A minute later he was pounding into the wind several hundred feet high. Gord got a photo of Falstaff, "just before we lost sight of him - what a great feeling! The result was spectacular and one of the highlights of any rehab situation I have ever been involved with."

Before he took flight, Falstaff was banded on both legs, one red and the other a standard US Fish and Wildlife band. As Alastair said, "We will be looking very hard next spring in the hope that he returns to the Rankin Inlet study area to breed." We all wish you the best Falstaff!





Okay, I'm at close to 800 words now and there're still so many issues related to GMOs to discuss. Clearly, I'm not going to get to everything. But I suggest you do some research for yourself. I see basically three sides to this important and growing debate: advocates, critics, and moderates. I classify myself in the last group. I'm definitely against GMOs and simultaneously, I realize that we're already eating them.

Even in organic foods. Oh yes. You read me right. According to a piece in The Western Producer (online), the organic programs manager for Nature's Path, a major North American organic foods label, indicated that "organic food made from corn, soybeans, canola and sugar definitely contain GMOs." Dag Falck spoke at the Guelph Organic Conference in February 2013 and cited unavoidable cross—pollination in the fields for what he calls "no such thing as zero percent of anything." (source: http://www.producer.com/2013/02/time-to-fess-up-organics-have-gmos)

Whether you consider "Frankenfruit" a laughable term or not, it's a good idea to educate yourself and your family about the state of global agriculture and issues such as food safety. My suggestion? Start with "Twenty Questions on Genetically Modified Foods" on the WHO (World Health Organization) site: http://www.who.int/foodsafety/publications/biotech/20questions/en.

From there, you might want to check out this excellent article from the US National Public Radio, or NPR, website: http://n.pr/13EZeqF. (It was a sooper long link! So I truncated it.) For those unfamiliar, NPR was originally the radio version of PBS television. NPR has expanded into various digital media I consider them a reliable source for US news.
