Rio Terrace Community Soccer

Registration for the 2014 Outdoor Soccer season (EMSA West community level of play) will take place at the Rio Terrace Community League Hall on Saturday February 22 from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Please attend this session if you can.

There will also be a late registration session on Tuesday March 4 at the Double Tree Inn (formerly the Mayfield Inn) from 6 PM to 9 PM.

Please contact director@rioterracesoccer.ca if you are not able to attend either of these registration sessions. Each player being registered for community soccer needs to provide proof of community league membership, AB Health Care Card, and 2 cheques (only results for our Rio Terrace teams. Most of the Rio 1 for U-6).

The Community Outdoor Soccer Program is for children aged 4 through 18 (as of Dec 31, 2014) with age groups, birth years, fees and nights of play (tentative) as follows:

Outdoor Soccer games will start (weather permitting) in late April /early May and continue through to the end of players. Our soccer playing children – and the parents June, followed by City Championships (1st week of July) and Inter-Cities Championships (mid July).

The Rio Terrace U6 Fun Soccer Program is a great introductory program for future soccer players. On Monday and Wednesday evenings at the Rio Terrace soccer field during May and June mixed teams of boys and girls aged 4 through 6 learn about soccer and team play while they emulate their dinosaur team names (a Rio Terrace tradition) and battle for supremacy, or at least have lots of fun and most importantly, enjoy their half time treats!! This is a fun oriented skill development Program where the parents can participate in the games and skill sessions.

The **U8 Program** continues the focus on player skills development through the format of a 20 – 30 minute skills and training session followed by a 25 - 30 minute game each night. This provides a great learning and development environment for the players and follows the direction of the Canadian Soccer Association's Long Term Player Development Plan.

2013 / 2014 Indoor Season Coming to a Close

The 2013 / 2014 Indoor Soccer season has been very exciting for the 11 Rio Terrace teams. Questions I'm Asked About Feeding Birds

Q: How can I keep Magpies away from my bird feeder?

This is a question we get asked a lot. Black-billed Magpies are part of the Corvid family related to Crows, Ravens, and Blue Jays – all very intelligent birds, which makes them tricky to deter. They can be noisy and aggressive and can dominate a feeder when they are in the yard. We recommend passive solutions which do not harm the birds but restrict or guide their behaviour. Magpies, Blue Jays, squirrels, and other birds such as Chickadees all love peanuts. If you put peanuts in the shell out in a separate feeder, this can draw Magpies away from your other feeders. Physical barriers such as placing a cage around the feeder that allows small birds to enter the feeder but not the larger ones can help. We have a "Dinner Bell" feeder with a rain/snow guard that can be lowered to cover the feeder tray and restrict access of larger birds. One of our customers has had success using a wireless doorbell, with the doorbell in the feeder being operated by remote control from the kitchen when a Magpie lands in the feeder, scaring it off. Fortunately Magpies are not in the yard all the time, which allows other birds plenty of time to access your feeder. Their population has increased over the years so these fascinating birds will continue to be a challenge.

Q: Where are the Redpolls this year?

Last winter we saw large numbers of Common Redpolls (see photo) in Edmonton and area. But this winter there have been very few. The Edmonton Christmas Bird Count found just 144 Redpolls, compared to over 2000 last year. In St. Albert, none were seen at all. We suspected that might happen. Each year Ron Pittaway from Ontario produces a "Finch Forecast" that is pretty good at predicting the winter movement of finches, which includes Common Redpolls and Pine Siskins, common feeder birds. He bases the forecast on the crop of pine cones in the northern boreal forest. If it's a good crop, which it was this year from Alaska to Atlantic Canada, we are less likely to see these species. Why fly south when these birds can stay in their northern summer range and have lots of food? To give you an idea of how good the pine cone crop was, one of our Edmonton customers picked up over 5000 pine cones

off the ground under her 3 large spruce trees in her yard.

Q: Why am I hearing Chickadees singing?

I can hear one singing through the window as I write. As you listen, you'll notice there are often two or more calling, almost singing counterpoint to one another. Males begin singing in mid-January with increasing frequency as the winter progresses with females joining in occasionally. If you think the song sounds like "Hi, sweetie" you're right. It's the males calling to attract potential mates.



Green Corner

The norm for a start-of-the-year Green Corner column is to talk about what's in store for the year ahead in eco-living. This would include a list of various interesting things for us to do to decrease our carbon footprint, or to increase our green savvy, or to make living green more fun. Something along these lines:

- Some new ideas for how to save money by being green around the house
- Some recipes for organic meals that children will simply adore
- The best websites to use in calculating one's environmental footprint, as a way to mark the starting point in this year's environmental efforts
- Some startling statistics on the state of that hole in the ozone and the build-up of GHGs and the rising of the ocean levels
- A summary of where Canada stands now, in global rankings for ecological accountability, since our government rescinded adherence to the Kyoto Protocol (remember the Kyoto Protocol?)
- The latest technologies in energy production or homebuilding or vehicle efficiency or water recycling or organic farming....

Well, I think it would be more useful to take a step back. Take a deep breath. Reassess this whole environmental awareness / activism / lifestyle choices phenomenon.

Because let's face it. The Internet is crammed with advice and how-to tips, information and statistics. I'm frankly grateful for it and will continue to mine online for nuggets of the most intriguing and approachable bits to share with you, my community. For this Green Corner, though, I've been pondering a related question:

How do we measure the impact of our green actions?

Is it in the money saved at the end of each month? Each year? Is it the decline in the number of trash bags we take to the curb each week? Do we measure our green impact by an increase in blue bags at the curb and in donations to reuse centres and non-profits? How about gauging by the number of friends, family, neighbours and businesses we've influenced to switch to green power? For some of us, perhaps the gauge is in how eco-friendly our new infill home build is. For others still, we might measure by the size and yield of our house gardens—which often has a direct impact on our wallets at the grocery store.

Or maybe, it's in the pride with which we can say to our grandchildren (and great-grandchildren) that we did our absolute level best to take care of the planet for them.

I think measuring the impact of my green choices is integral to keeping my commitment alive and in front of me everyday. Maybe your commitment is different than mine. Mine is to live responsibly with regard to the health of my fellow human beings and to the health of our planet. If I don't see how my choices make a difference, then I'm not very likely to continue making the same choices.

This is why ad agencies use money, or the bottom line, as the gauge in their commercials and ads for so many green products. It's the most visible difference, the most easily understood. Thirty seconds isn't enough time to get philosophical, after all.

But I think most of us know that money can't be the only measure we use. It's a very narrow set of parameters. Too narrow to use to quantify the unquantifiable: quality of life. The nation of Bhutan, however, is giving it a go, with its now-famous Gross National Happiness (GNH) index. From www.grossnationalhappiness.com:

The concept implies that sustainable development should take a holistic approach towards notions of progress and give equal importance to non-economic aspects of wellbeing. The concept of GNH has often been explained by its four pillars: good governance, sustainable socio-economic development, cultural preservation, and environmental conservation. Lately the four pillars have been further classified into nine domains in order to create widespread understanding of GNH and to reflect the holistic range of GNH values. The nine domains are: psychological wellbeing, health, education, time use, cultural diversity and resilience, good governance, community vitality, ecological diversity and resilience, and living standards.

We, as individuals, may not need to break down the aspects of our lives into four pillars and nine domains, but I think it important to consider how the green choices we make **do** impact whatever areas of our lives are precious to us. We need a personal happiness index, so to speak—to understand what drives us in making the choices we make. We need to comprehend the connection between the choices we face and their attendant consequences. That leads, I believe, to **actively** choosing the impact we make with our green choices, rather than just understanding the impact.

Otherwise, what's going to make it worth it for us to trek back out to the car in -36° to get the darned cloth bags instead of just using the store's plastic ones?


