Spray Park Update

The spray park committee has been busy and we are moving forward! Our Needs Assessment Survey has started and has been included with this edition of the community newsletter. The Needs Assessment Survey is required by the City of Edmonton as part of the spray park development process. We need to all surveys completed by March 31, 2015.

We are also entering the fundraising portion of the project. Obviously we need money if we want to build a spray park. We will be applying for several grants to offset the costs. The two main grants are through the City of Edmonton and the Province of Alberta. If we receive these (we stand a good chance) we will still need to raise another \$100,000 through smaller grants and fundraising initiatives. Please consider giving a donation of time (I just know there are some awesome grant application writers in our community!) or money to help cover the costs of this amazing addition to the Rio Terrace Park. By the way - all donations receive a tax receipt.

Rio Terrace Community Soccer

Registration for the 2015 Outdoor Soccer season (EMSA West community level of play) will take place at the Rio Terrace Community League Hall on Saturday March 7 from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Please attend this session if you can.

There will also be a late registration session on Tuesday March 10 at the Double Tree Inn (formerly the Mayfield Inn) from 6 PM to 9 PM.

Outdoor Soccer games will start (weather permitting) in late April /early May and continue through to the end of June, followed by City Championships (1st week of July) and Inter-Cities Championships (mid July).

The Rio Terrace U6 Fun Soccer Program is a great introductory program for future soccer players. On Monday and Wednesday evenings at the Rio Terrace soccer field during May and June mixed teams of boys and girls aged 4 through 6 learn about soccer and team play while they emulate their dinosaur team names (a Rio Terrace tradition) and battle for supremacy, or at least have lots of fun and most importantly, enjoy their half time treats!! This is a fun oriented skill development Program where the parents can participate in the games and skill sessions.

The **U8 Program** continues the focus on player skills development through the format of a 20 – 25 minute skills and training session followed by a 30 minute game each night. This provides a great learning and development environment for the players and follows the direction of the Canadian Soccer Association's Long Term Player Development Plan.

COMMUNITY REAL ESTATE MATTERS



The Real Estate market for 2014 was strong and busy, showing an increase in the average sale price for single family homes in the Edmonton area. The average price for 2014 was \$367,228, up 5.2% from 2013. Single family homes finished the year 5.6% higher than in 2013 at an average of \$432,713. The average price of a condo was \$252,175, up 4.5% from 2013.

Looking specifically at our neighbourhoods, Patricia Heights had an average sale price of \$475,558 for single family homes in 2014. That is an average of \$323.74 per square foot. The high sold price was \$715,000 while the low sold price was \$327,500.

Rio Terrace had an average sale price of \$499,355 for single family homes. That is an average price per square foot of \$370.41. The high sold price was \$1,025,000 while the low sold price was \$350,000.

Quesnell Heights had an average sale price of \$723,512 with an average price per square foot of \$335.82. The high sold price was \$1,250,000 while the low sold price was \$412,000.

Prices are expected to fluctuate throughout the year according to the Edmonton Real Estate Board's 2015 Housing Forecast. The uncertainty surrounding oil prices may leave buyers more cautious but despite this the Board anticipates that the average price for a single family home is going to increase about 3.5%. Condominium property average prices are projected to increase at a lower rate of about 2.5% over the year

Community Babysitting Course

Our neighborhood has lots of kids, so we're hoping a babysitter's course and a subsequent meet & greet will help meet demand for babysitting in the area. We will therefore offer a Red Cross Babysitter's Course Saturday, March 28th from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. We will then connect babysitters with the families that need them with a meet & greet. The meet & greet will be Sunday March 29th, 2015 from 1-2 p.m. All course participants must be over 11 and obtain parental consent if under 18. The cost for the course is \$57.75 per person (tax included) which provides a Red Cross Babysitter's Manual (usually costs \$25), wallet certification card, and registration with The Red Cross (usually \$20). The meet & greet will be free for babysitters and community league parents.

COURSE INFORMATION


Instructor: Sarah Dewhurst has just finished her education degree. She has been teaching lifesaving courses since 2008, swim lessons since 2009, and has been lifeguarding and instructor training since 2012. She has been teaching first aid and first aid related courses (like this one) since 2009. She has considerable experience with children through years of babysitting and job as a swim instructor.

In the course: Participants will learn about creating safe environments, caring for all age groups of children, the business of babysitting, how to handle emergencies, and basic first aid, as well as games & activities.



A Hummer in Every Yard

Not a Hum V but a Hum B, that is - Ruby-throated Hummingbirds in as many Edmonton back yards as possible, to be more specific.

Attracting a lot more hummingbirds into the city of Edmonton is the goal of a new initiative being taken by Wild Birds Unlimited this Spring and Summer. The project aims to encourage people with yards, gardens, flower boxes and hanging baskets to use their garden space to plant flowers, put out feeders, and decorations that will attract hummingbirds.

Anyone who has seen hummingbirds up close knows their unique and captivating magic. We are often asked the question, "Do we get hummingbirds in Edmonton?" The answer is "yes." But regrettably we don't get as many as we could. Many other cities across North America have lots of hummingbirds. The Hummer Summer Project encourages people to do the things required to make Edmonton a city full of hummingbirds.

Edmonton's Michael Wiens knows a lot about Ruby-throated Hummingbirds, the variety we see in Edmonton. He published a book called Jewel of the North summarizing his techniques for attracting hummers and his careful observations of them in his yards in and outside of the city over seven years. You might call him a Hummingbird Whisperer as he has been able to attract large numbers to his yard year after year. In fact last summer saw an unprecedented number of hummers both in and out of the city.

The first hummingbirds arrive in the Edmonton area every year between May 10 and May 20. Thousands fly over and past Edmonton as they either return to their old nesting areas, or the young, who don't yet have a territory, search for their own space. It's these young hummers we are aiming to attract by providing them with a territory that they and their future family members will return to year after year — in your garden.

"By planning your backyard garden in advance you can greatly increase the chances of attracting hummers to your yard," according to Wiens. This involves using types of annuals and perennials that hummingbirds can get nectar from, knowing where to place plants in your yard, and the types of feeders to use and where to position them. Starting in February we will be providing flower seeds so



you can start your own flowers for attracting hummingbirds. In March we will feature Michael Wiens in the store to answer all your questions and later in the Spring we will be emphasizing bedding plants and flowering baskets. We also will have a large selection of hummingbird feeders in a wide range of prices.

Come in to the store to find flower seeds for hummingbirds, information on hummingbird feeders, plus tips on gardening for hummers and hummingbird feeding. Let's all have "a Hummer Summer!"



What about when you and your neighbour can't agree on which contractor's quote to go with when the shared fence is called to the great pastureland in the sky? What about when you find someone's deposited their dog poop into your trash can sometime between the time you put it at the curb on Tuesday night and when you retrieve it Wednesday—but which remains at the bottom of your trash can because the trash collectors don't dump out trash cans anymore, they only pick up large bags? (Yes, this last just happened to me. Again. *sigh* Should I be grateful s/he didn't just let her/his dog go on my sidewalk or lawn? 'Cause that's happened too.) Where's the feeling of community then? And what the heck does any of this have to do with a column on green living and being environmentally conscientious? You guessed it: everything.

As I've mentioned before, I drive an electric motor/gas engine hybrid car. I compost all year long. I participate in Earth Hour in March. I eschew plastic bags in favour of reusable cloth ones. I use vinegar and baking soda to clean my home. . I use hydrogen peroxide bleach on my laundry. I re-use the rinse water from cleaning veg and fruit to water my garden plants in the summer.

Preparing For the Inevitable

Practical Funeral Planning For Peace of MindBy Yvonne Racine, Life Celebrant and Coach

One of the things we all must face is the inevitability of death. There are no guarantees for any of us healthy or otherwise, young or old, rich or poor as to how long we will live.

Given death is a fact of life, it's a good idea to give some thought to what you would like in terms of whether you want burial or cremation or your body donated to science; whether you want a farewell ceremony or not and if so would you like a religious ceremony or more of a celebration of your life. Even if you have a will it doesn't mean these items will be covered and wills are often not even looked at until after the funeral.

An important thing to consider, which can come as quite a shock when faced with having to make funeral arrangements, is that dying can be fairly expensive. Costs average around \$7000 and can run as high as \$30,000+ depending on how elaborate you or your next of kin want to get, or think you should get.

One of the problems with failing to do some preplanning around final arrangements is that your loved ones aren't always thinking straight when they're making arrangements. It's easy to spend more than can really be afforded when there are feelings of guilt or the belief that getting the best and most expensive is how you show your love. It could be that the person who has died wanted their money to go to the people they love rather than being spent on an expensive and extravagant funeral. Conversely, if the resources are available and you

want something extravagant you can plan for that too.

When the deceased has made arrangements beforehand the executor or next of kin left with the task of looking after the arrangements don't have to figure it all out on their own. They still have plenty to do and there are always lots of details to sort out but the big decisions are already looked after.

If you would like to get information about preplanning final arrangements for yourself or a family member, you can contact The Memorial Society of Edmonton and District (MSED) for help. MSED is a not for profit society dedicated to providing members with education, guidance and reduced costs. MSED is not a funeral provider; they are a volunteer organization with individual members. There is a onetime membership fee of \$30.00 which provides members with planning forms and information as well as access to a number of well established, reputable providers in the greater Edmonton area who have agreed to provide special pricing for MSED members.

Disconnect to Reconnect

Recently I heard two young people joke about school. 'What's the best thing about school?' said one to the other, 'Learning to text with your phone in your pocket' replied his friend. On the bus into town the other day, I looked around at everyone on their ipods, mobile phones and blackberry's busily texting and updating their current status and location for all to see. Nearby two teenage girls were gossiping about who was dating who, arguing whether it was true or not as it was not on Facebook. Technology is such a huge part of our lives nowadays and for young people it is as if they are living two lives; their offline world and their private online world.

As I sat there, I started thinking about technology and all the devices we now use that make it easier to connect with people and I wondered whether technology does in fact bring us closer to the people in our lives or if it pushes us further away from the people we care about?

When you open the front door to a family home nowadays, what you can often find are family members in different rooms Skyping, Texting, IMing or Gaming... no- one is talking to each other. Even when you do manage to sit down and have a conversation or a meal together, it is filled with TV's blaring, emailing and texting in their pockets, with little time for actual talking. It is no wonder that people are

concerned about technology breaking down family communication as it takes up our attention and can be an individual pursuit.

However all is not lost, many of us remember a time when mealtimes, especially dinner time brought the whole family together to share their day's experience and stay involved in each other's lives. In today's fast-paced world, however mealtimes are often seen as insignificant or a luxury, families cannot afford, time wise. Yet research indicates that having meals together has a positive impact on family communications. It can be used as a time for teaching children and young people basic social skills for communicating, empathy and sharing family values, as well as staying connected and involved with each other.

When I speak to parents of teenagers about technology and the affects it has on the family and their relationships with their teenagers, many will speak of times when they have gone on family holidays, where the use of technologies have been limited or banned. During these times parents feel that their relationships with their teenagers improve as they spend the time talking and connecting with each other.

So even though technology has become a part of our daily existence, it is important to disconnect, even for one meal a day, so you can reconnect with family.

I blah blah blah.... But what difference is any of that going to make to my neighbours? To you, dear Reader? Well, this is the perfect place to introduce you to the concept of "Outrospection." It's a term coined by Roman Krznaric, philosopher, author, and renowned international expert on Empathy as a pathway to social transformation.

I urge you to spend the 10 or so minutes it takes to watch a creative and engaging video about this concept. They've taken a live talk done by Dr. Krznaric and done an RSA animation. Please find it here:

Outrospection's central tenet is the practice of Empathy as a way to get outside of ourselves, to move past insularity, and to be able to experience things from another's perspective; thereby creating a new understanding from which to solve the issues that are in front of us now. That's the Coles Notes version, anyway.

So, within the context of Outrospection, my choices regarding cars and water usage and cleaners and plastics are ways that I think/act/consider outside of myself. And what's outside of myself, what's there for me to consider at the moment of those choices, is the planet: the physical environment in which I live.

Our community is part of that physical environment, even as it's simultaneously more than just its streets, its parks, its ice rinks and its trees. Similarly, we are more than just the sum of our tangible parts. We as a species have exercised immense power over this planet. And you know what they say: with great power comes great responsibility. That's what the social contract is all about: our responsibility to one another, now and in the future. What do you want to be responsible for?
