Thank you everyone who completed our recent survey on a spray park for our neighbourhood. We received 130 responses from families in the community and over 80% strongly support the spraypark initiative.

Whether it is for our children, grandchildren or visitors to our community, a spraypark will be a welcome addition for healthy and social activities during our beautiful summer months. And, we will be incorporating design elements so that during all the seasons we experience here in Edmonton the space will be another play zone for all age groups.

## So what is next? Planning, public consultation and raising money!

A small group of volunteers is working with the City on the concept plan for the site. The theme of the site has yet to be determined and that is where you, our community come in. As soon as we are ready we will be inviting you all to a public open house to provide your input on the theme, concept and design of the park. We hope this will happen before the end of summer. We are also developing the budget and fund raising plan. There will be a call out for donations and to participate in our fund raising programs throughout the next 12 months. Our goal is to begin construction next year but there is still a lot to be done.

For our first spray park fundraiser we are partnering with Billyco Junction Gardens in Lacombe, AB to bring you chemical free locally grown produce. Fresh fruit and vegetables will be delivered weekly to our Rio Terrace neighbourhood where you can pick them up. The purchases you make benefit our community Spray Park initiative which will receive a 7% return on every purchase made at Billyco Junction. We are also including a paper version of the form - you can drop off completed forms with payment information in the mailbox at the Rio Terrace Hall.


## Community League Bylaw Update

#### Edmonton's Front Yards are in Bloom

Spring is here, and we want to see your bloomin' great yards! The Front Yards in Bloom program is all about recognizing neighbours who make an effort to beautify their front yards.

Front Yards in Bloom started in 1999, with 150 nominations in its first year. It is now the largest program of its kind in Canada. Last year, we received over 3,400 nominations city-wide. This year, our goal is to receive 3,700 nominations. Nominations can be submitted Wed May 20 – Tues June 30.

Front Yards can be nominated in one of four categories:

- **General**: Appealing front yards that makes people smile as they pass by! These yards could include a variety of colours, textures, plants, and garden features.
- Natural: Yards with a "natural" aesthetic, using native plants, and limited pesticides and herbicides.
- Edible: Yards incorporating edible fruits, flowers, and plants into the landscape design.
- **Public Spaces** (\*New\*): Yards with landscaping features and aesthetic appeal in front of a public building (including schools, businesses/offices, multi-unit residences, churches, and community league halls)

After the nomination deadline, volunteers deliver a sign and brochure to each nominated yard, and also choose some top yards for recognition. Edmonton Native Plant Group and Sustainable Food Edmonton judge the top Natural and Edible yards, respectively. Results will be announced during the **Edmonton in Bloom Awards on August 12**th at **City Hall**. Everyone is invited to attend the celebration!

## Outdoor Soccer Season is Underway!



The Rio Terrace 2015 Outdoor Community Soccer Program is fully underway and once again the Rio Terrace Soccer Program is one of the larger community programs in the northwest quadrant of Edmonton. For the 2015 outdoor season, Rio Terrace is home to 15 youth soccer teams playing in the EMSA / EMSAwest community soccer program in the U8 through U18 age groups. This means that we have over 260 children registered and playing on Rio Terrace teams. The Rio Terrace Soccer Program continues to be a vibrant and strong offering to our community youth. Each and every one of the Rio Terrace teams is now full to capacity and we were fortunate enough to not have to turn any registrants away and we only had a handful of registrants that we had to place on teams not based out of Rio Terrace.

May and June will be busy months for these soccer players (and parents) as they play games twice a week and generally practice once a week. There are 5 U8 teams and 4 U10 teams who have the school fields at either of Patricia Heights or Rio Terrace as their home fields, so there will be lots of soccer being played in our community. Weather permitting, every weeknight Monday through Thursday there will be games starting at 6:15 PM on these fields. Come on out and enjoy some of the action and see why soccer is such a popular activity for the community youth.

Most of the Rio Terrace teams will also playing in the EMSA West Slurpee Cup soccer tournament May 29 – 31. Good luck to all of our teams and hopefully the weekend is full of great soccer, great times and great weather!

#### Rio Terrace U6 Fun Soccer - WOW!!

The Rio Terrace U6 FunSoccer Program has absolutely exploded this year in terms of number of teams and players. We have 8 dinosaur named teams and over 80 players participating in the Program. Having averaged roughly 60 players in the Program the last few years, this year's turnout would suggest that we have a rejuvenation of young families in our

community – a great thing to see. The Rio Terrace U6 FunSoccer Program is an in-house program – meaning that we run this ourselves and all of the activity takes place Mondays and Wednesdays starting at 6:15 PM at the large soccer field north of the Rio Terrace School.

### What!? Close the Preschool?

In a conversation a few weeks ago, a community member and I were talking about a preschool issue of low enrollment. I was shocked when the older man I was speaking with said, "Well, why doesn't it just close." Immediately, my emotions started to take over.

How could this person think that was a good idea? It was mind-boggling to me! Did he know that preschool gives children the opportunity to play, solve problems, and be creative in a social setting? Did he know that it is different than day care as there is a curriculum developed by child development experts? Did he know that by enrolling your child in preschool that they will experience more success throughout their schooling? It may seem like such a small thing when a child is so young but children are learning machines – they learn constantly from each experience every day. High quality, play-based learning experiences are imperative for children to develop good communication, socialization skills, and develop confidence.

Preschool is different than playgroups, gymnastics, or music classes. Preschools teach children how to be students! They learn independence as they are left at school and moms and dads run off for some errands or well-earned breaks. Children learn how to wait, raise their hand, listen, share the teacher's attention, and get along with others. The social butterfly can spread her wings and wallflowers may blossom. All of this provides children with confidence and readiness skills for formal schooling.

I was also taken aback by my friend's comment, as I believe he didn't realize that areas offering preschool are indicators of vibrant communities. Preschools build networks of parents, involve them in their neighbourhood, and draw families to engage with others. Real estate prices are higher, people are friendlier, and parks are active and well kept. A preschool draws people with values and commitment to neighbourhoods.

Rio Terrace Preschool is undergoing a rebuilding, of sorts. With new staff, program changes away from being a parent cooperative, and minor improvements to their space the Preschool is anticipating increased enrolment. Historically, Rio Terrace Preschool has been an integral part of our community and, I hope, continues to be.

After my rant, I hope my friend appreciates his broadened perspective on preschool programs. And, I look forward to seeing our community preschool build confident, independent children.

## Ease children into the arts for a lifetime of appreciation!



A love for the arts and

culture begins at a young age. By exposing your children to various aspects of the art world and encouraging their creative inclinations at home, you are ensuring a life-long appreciation that will be beneficial as they move into adulthood. Whether they grow to become lawyers, doctors, teachers or marine biologists, their exposure to the arts will help them to think outside of the box and learn to express themselves creatively throughout their life.

Although some parents may think their children are too young to appreciate formal art and cultural exhibitions, children of all ages can enjoy, learn and be inspired by taking part. By following some of these simple suggestions, your next adventure to your local museum, art gallery or science centre is sure to be fun-filled for the whole family.

Before you set out on your excursion, research and discuss with your children ahead of time what you will be seeing and try to relate it to something they are already familiar with. For example, if you're planning an outing to the aquarium, watch Finding Nemo a few days before and talk about all of the colourful aquatic life that is seen in the film. Similarly, if you're going to be visiting an art gallery encourage them to create their best Picasso and sketch or paint a picture of something that inspires them. Or, encourage them to decorate some picture frames and display them in their bedroom to showcase their talents and one of their favourite photographs.

Try building a scavenger hunt into your day at each cultural institution that you visit. Read up on what will

be on display as part of the exhibitions and write out a list of things for them to find while you're there. At the end, they will feel a sense of accomplishment and be more likely to retain what they learned during the outing.



#### **Bird Questions!**

### When should I put my hummingbird feeder out?

The hummers have already started to cross the Caribbean and are heading up through the southern states on their way to western Canada. We can expect to see returning Ruby-throated Hummingbirds around May 10 this year. It's a good idea to get your feeders filled and ready to put out shortly after May 5. The reason to put them out this early is so that the males, who usually arrive before the females, will see your feeder as they begin passing through looking for territories with good food supplies. Most hummingbirds recognize feeders as sources of food as they have either been shown them by their mothers, or have used them on their journey south on migration. It's good to use a feeder that is easy to fill and clean, and one that allows you to see the bird regardless of where it is on the feeder. The nectar they need is easy to prepare, I part granulated white sugar mixed with 4 parts warm water, to help it dissolve. Keep some in the fridge to make it easy to refill the feeder.

## Do I need to feed the birds this spring and summer?

Springtime for birds means a shift from focussing purely on survival to propagation of the species. What we see now is the return of summer birds, more courting behaviour between male and female birds, checking out of nesting boxes, and building nests. Access to abundant and healthy food supplies is important to birds...regardless of the season. Bird feeders allow birds to spend less time foraging for food and more time engaging in activities that enhance their health and safety. It does not make them too lazy, or too dependent. These misconceptions have been dispelled by modern research and observation. Bird feeders can play an important role in maintaining some populations of birds where less natural food is available. During nesting season adult birds with a backyard food supply have more time to select better nesting sites and construct higher quality nests. And more food for adult birds means the chicks also receive more food, can be healthier, and are more likely to survive.

#### Do we get Cardinals in Alberta?

These beautiful birds are originally native of the American South but are now present in most areas of Eastern Canada with the occasional rare sighting in Alberta. The hotspot for Central Alberta is Sherwood Park where there have been at least one, and perhaps as many as three, breeding pairs of Northern Cardinals. A Sherwood Park couple who are long time bird feeders had a male show up at their feeder starting in 2006. He persisted until a female arrived in 2008. Magic happened and a chick from the union was feeding from their bird feeder in 2009. Since then the frequency of sightings has increased slowly. At the store, we've had reports of Cardinal sightings by customers in Redwater, Gibbons, Fort Saskatchewan, Strathcona County, and Sherwood Park confirming that area as the one to watch for growth in the breeding population. There have been occasional sightings in the City of Edmonton and just west of Devon. If you have seen a Northern Cardinal, we'd love to hear from you.



## Hormone Havoc – From Imbalance to Bliss

One of my first cases in practice was a 51-year-old woman who was experiencing very difficult symptoms from menopause. She wasn't sleeping because of extreme hot flashes and night sweats, and this was affecting her ability to function at work during the day. With this type of concern, typically there are three levels of hormone therapy:

- I) Synthetic the most potent
- 2) Bio-identical hormone therapy still synthetic, but the chemical components are *similar in molecular structure to human hormones* which is why it is referred to as "bio-identical"
- 3) Naturopathic treatment using diet, lifestyle suggestions, herbs, homeopathics and nutraceuticals.

First, one must recognize that the understanding of the menstrual cycle and hormonal symptoms in Western medicine has been 'medicalized'. Instead of seeing that signals from the body (i.e., menstrual cramps, heavy periods, irregular flow, abdominal bloating, cravings, increased appetite, weight gain, irritability, anxiety/nervous tension, crying, depression, forgetfulness, mood swings, breast tenderness/lumps, dizziness/faintness, fatigue, headaches, hot flashes, night sweats, vaginal dryness, and insomnia) are messages that you are out of balance hormonally, Western medicine deems that you have a medical condition- and the solution typically recommended is to take birth control. This approach is a suppressive hormonal therapy that puts women at risk for other health issues including hormone-related cancers if used for greater than 10 years.1

For most cases of hormone imbalance, supplements can be given to restore hormone balance. However, in the case when patients are interested in treatment without supplements, a possible prescription would be as follows:

- 1) Eliminate all stress in your life
- 2) See a counselor regarding marital difficulties
- 3) Quit dairy and wheat
- 4) Quit caffeine
- 5) Follow up in 2 weeks

When the above patient came to her next appointment, she was feeling 80% better and her symptoms had nearly resolved. The patient had originally stated that the primary stress in her life causing her anxiety was her marriage. To address this, she decided that she no longer wanted to work on the marriage and had verbalized to her husband that she wanted a divorce. She admitted that the dietary changes were difficult for her, but that she had been 100% compliant.

This remarkable case highlights a few key points:

- I. Less is often more
- 2. The role of stress in health
- 3. How the foods we eat and what we drink can either be supportive to our health or contribute to the decline of our health
- 4. There are physical, mental, emotional and spiritual aspects to health

When working with patients, the primary goal is to balance the neuro-endocrine system, as opposed to working from a label or diagnosis.

**Neuroendocrinology** is the study of the interaction between the nervous system and the endocrine system, including the biological features of the cells involved, cont'd on page 16

The study of neuroendocrinology arose from the recognition that the neurons from the part of the brain called the hypothalamus control secretion of hormones from the pituitary gland. The hormones in turn maintain balance in the body by regulating everything from reproduction, metabolism, eating and drinking behaviour, energy utilization and osmolarity to blood pressure. The glands involved in the system include the adrenal, parathyroid, pituitary and thyroid, as well as the ovaries, pancreas, and testes.

At menopause, the body's levels of progesterone, testosterone and estrogen naturally decline. When this happens, the primary back-up system in the body for production of these hormones is through the adrenal glands. 


