Rio Terrace Soccer Update Indoor Season Is Underway







Green Corner by Sandra Gangel

The other day I found myself chatting with a sales clerk at the sewing shop. I'd just broken the needle on the machine, you see. It was the first time that had ever happened, frankly, so I'd never actually had to buy new needles for the machine before. I mentioned this fact, adding that I'd been using this machine for probably 10 years now.

The clerk was aghast.

She reared back and said that I ought to be changing out the needles for each sewing project. I asked why, what would happen otherwise? Eyes still wide with shock, she listed a few dire mishaps should one be so careless as to re-use a needle. I mentally reviewed ten years' of sewing projects and replied that those things had never happened to me, actually.

She, holding the small packet of 5 spare needles, then said, "Well, these are so cheap. You can afford to change them out every time, can't you? Just to make sure." I glanced at the price tag; they were less than \$5.00, even with tax.

Less than \$1 for a single sewing needle. That's cheap by any standard, right?

And yet, even as I stood there, faced with a sales clerk scandalized by my cavalier attitude toward sewing projects, I wanted to protest: 'Actually, it's not. Cheap, that is. That five bucks doesn't account for the environmental costs at all.' I looked down at the packet. They were made in China.

Where, exactly, in China is mining country, anyway? What are the working conditions there? What's the toll on the land there? Is there a mined land reclamation board there to oversee clean-up? How has the health of nearby residents been impacted by the mine(s) and how do their health care costs match up to those in non-mining areas?

What about power usage at these mines—for housing, equipment, heating, lighting: diesel? wood? natural gas? coal? all of the above? And what about water consumption and other impacts on local water sources?

It's a vast topic to cover, and for just one sewing needle, no less. (Packaging materials and inks, we'll leave for now.) Decades ago, someone calculated the most efficient way to ship goods across the Pacific Ocean: pack as many things as possible for the same ship going in the one direction. Save money by cutting redundancies. Common sense, really.

It's no different than the practice of grouping one's errands together. Like bundling the Home Depot trip with the stop into Chapters with the trip to Staples—even if it means that darned table will be wobbly for a few days more and oh that new Lawrence Hill book just came out and hmmm, I hope the printer has enough paper....

We have a pretty good idea of how many resources we're personally using up on our errands. We see how much fuel we use in our cars every week or month. We see the monthly bill for water usage, water we use for washing (bodies, clothes, dishes) and drinking (tea, coffee) and cooking (everything). The power and gas people have also kindly placed those helpful little bar graphs onto our electricity and natural gas bills, so we can track our consumption for the past 12 months, give or take. Questions I'm Asked About Feeding Birds

Q: How can I keep woodpeckers from pecking on my house?

Generally, woodpeckers peck at houses for one of three reasons – to attract a mate or proclaim territory, to seek food (insects in the wood), or to try to create a nest in the side of a building. The two main options are to try to scare them away, or to prevent them from getting at your house. If a woodpecker begins to peck on your house, start right away to scare them off. Spray the woodpecker with water from a garden or high-pressure water hose, or children's water blaster. Suspend light pie plates, metal can lids or old CDs on a string in the area they are pecking. One end of the string can be near a convenient window or door. Jerk the line whenever the bird appears.

Attach string to the ends of aluminum foil strips cut two to three inches in width and two to three feet in length and hang them from damaged or tapping sites. Put up reflective pinwheels at pecking sights. Models or silhouettes of snakes, owls or hawks may be the least effective unless they are hung to move in the breeze and/or in conjunction with playing recorded calls of birds of prey. To exclude them from getting at you're their tapping spot, cover the site with plastic or nylon netting or hardware cloth. Permanent installation of hardware cloth or other screening may be the best solution when woodpeckers make repeated attempts over several years to make holes or nests. Metallic or wooden surfaces used for drumming may be wrapped or covered with cloth or foam. An alternative tapping site or surface such as a wooden box or metal cylinder hung in a less annoying location may be considered. Placing a woodpecker house over the area if the bird is interested in nesting may encourage the bird to stop creating another hole.

Q: Is there anything I should do to "winterize" my bird house?

In the fall, after the birds have finished nesting, it's a good idea to remove the nesting material to prepare the bird house for birds roosting overnight in the cold winter months. Scrub the inside with a mild detergent and water. If the box is dirty from bird droppings remove the nest and clean the nest box out with a

solution of I part bleach to 10 parts water. Depending on the size of the hole you may get visitors such as flying squirrels, and mice, but the most likely overnight visitors will be birds. Some, like the Downy Woodpecker, tend to roost alone. Others, like Chickadees, will roost together. A study found that birds can save as much as I I percent of their energy roosting in a cavity such as a nesting box, compared to roosting on a branch. So if you didn't have any birds in your bird houses this summer, don't despair. You could well have birds roosting in them this winter! In the spring, open your nesting box to see if there are new feathers from birds that roosted over the winter.

Q: Where do you get your peanuts from?

Peanuts are one of those crops that we don't get a chance to see much in Canada. That is because most peanut varieties require 3000 heat units to grow and mature and there are very few regions in Canada that get those kind of heat units. There are some peanuts grown in southern Ontario but for the most part, peanuts in North America are grown in the southern states - Georgia and Texas primarily as well as Alabama, North Carolina, Florida and Virginia. Peanuts are also grown in other parts of the world including Latin America and China but for quality control reasons, our peanuts come exclusively from the United States.

We dole out our hard-earned money to pay the costs for consuming those resources.

But just as when we pay less than \$1 for a single sewing needle from China, we aren't actually accounting for the environmental and social justice costs of those resources.

Edmontonians, by and large, use electricity powered by coal-fired plants. The majority of us never even know to ask where that coal is mined, let alone see the effects of coal being burned at a plant. Just like the electricity itself, that entire process is invisible to most of us.

Where does coal get mined in Alberta? Where is it processed? Is there a mined land reclamation board in place to oversee clean-up? Are mining corporations being suitably 'taxed' to create a robust, realistic reclamation fund? What about health care costs? Are miners at more risk of injury and/or health problems?

I bet there are some of you who know some of these answers. I admit that I don't know them all. From any perspective—ecological or economic or social—we don't live in a perfect system. We simply don't have the accounting system for each individual aspect, let alone a way to calculate how it all comes together.

But if we want to make a start, there are some things we can do.

A first step is to watch The Story of Stuff from 2007. It's a small peek into how our consumerism impacts the world in ways we normally don't see. (Yes, I've mentioned it here before. Yes, it's still relevant and impactful.)



You can use this link (https://youtu.be/9GorqroigqM) or just google it. Twenty minutes that really can change your life. (That's the book cover above, in case you'd prefer to read the book, which has more in-depth exploration.)

Another good starting point is an environmental impact calculator. Most found online will measure your GHGs (greenhouse gas emissions) and are

A decent one is available on <u>CarbonZero.ca</u>. I suggest doing the full calculation first. But, there are many other calculators out there; again, Google is your friend with this. Choose one from a reputable web site; answer the questions honestly; find out how much of the planet's resources you currently consume. Make changes from there.

A low-tech, easy-to-do step is to be mindful when purchasing or researching purchases. Consider place of origin; how far it travels from there; and the corresponding hydrocarbons burned to move it here. This applies whether you buy online or in-person.

For example, much organic produce, especially in our winter months, actually costs more in ecological impact than non-organic produce. So, I buy the non-organic peppers grown and shipped from Mexico rather than the organic ones grown and shipped from Israel. (In case you're wondering, here to Mexico City: 3982 km. To Tel Aviv: 10 007 km)

Heck, if I were really, fully committed, I'd research water and power usage trends in the growing areas too. And take a look at their health care system; their working conditions; their track record of land stewardship. But I don't, not even once I'm home from the store. I just make my best estimate and choose.

Like I said before, it's not a perfect world and we can't always do everything perfectly. Nevertheless, wouldn't you rather do something imperfect than nothing at all?
