2016 outdoor soccer season underway

The weather has cooperated and the Rio Terrace 2016 Outdoor Community Soccer Program is fully underway. Once again the Rio Terrace Soccer Program is one of the larger community programs in the northwest quadrant of Edmonton. Rio Terrace is hosting 15 youth soccer teams that play in the EMSA / EMSAWEST community soccer program in the U8 through U18 age groups. This means that we have over 260 children registered and playing on these Rio Terrace teams. The Rio Terrace Soccer Program continues to be a vibrant and strong community program. Every Rio Terrace team is now full to capacity and we are unable to accept any more registrants.

May and June will be busy months for these soccer players (and parents) as they play games twice a week and generally practice once a week. There are 5 U8 teams and 3 U10 teams who have the school fields at either of Patricia Heights or Rio Terrace as their home fields, so there will be lots of soccer being played in our community. Weather permitting, every weeknight Monday through Thursday there will be games starting at 6:15 PM on these fields. Come on out and enjoy some of the action and see why soccer is such a popular activity for the community youth.

Many of the Rio Terrace teams will also playing in the EMSAWEST Slurpee Cup soccer tournament June 3 - 5. Good luck to all of our teams and enjoy a weekend full of full of great soccer, great times and hopefully great weather!



BACKGROUND In April 2015, Edmonton City Council changed the development bylaws to allow for increased density in all mature neighbourhoods. This has implications for Rio Terrace, Patricia Heights and many other neighbourhoods. The changes allow dividing existing lots into smaller lots with the intent of building two skinny houses.

Many residents have expressed concerns about this. They like the neighbourhood the way it is, with low population density and wide lots. The bylaw changes will, over time, alter the character and value of our neighbourhoods.

Many residents approached City Council and attended public hearings to ask Council to reconsider these changes. Despite all our efforts, the City is determined to approve every subdivision and, on Friday April 8, 2016 lot 51 subdivision was approved. We have lost a battle but not the war, and we do need to limit the changes that the bylaw will cause.

A potential solution for owners who oppose the new city bylaw is to band together and enter into an agreement called a **Restrictive Covenant** (**RC**) to prevent lot splitting and the inevitable changes to our neighborhoods.

GOING FORWARD A "covenant" is a contractual obligation that involves a promise by one party to another. In the real-estate context, a Restrictive Covenant is a promise by the owner of land that restricts or prohibits the use of that land in some way. RCs usually operate outside of, and in addition to, municipal zoning bylaws. A RC is an agreement between the owners of two or more parcels of land instead of being rules imposed by government.

Restrictive Covenants set rules about what can be done with a property. Sometimes, they are prepared by the neighbourhood developer and are registered against the title to land. Our understanding is that the developer of Quesnell Height has registered such an RC for most of the lots in that neighbourhood. However this was not done in Rio Terrace and Patricia Heights.

The rules set out in Restrictive Covenants are usually placed or registered against the title to property at the Land Titles Office and the rules "run with the land". This means that the rules are binding upon both present and future owners of the property.

If a homeowner does not follow the rules on the property, then any other person who owns property in the neighbourhood and has the same Restrictive Covenant registered on his or her title, is entitled to go to court to enforce the rules. This could include a Cease and Desist court order to stop a construction project, or a Court Order for the forced removal or demolition of a non-complying structure. The proposed RC will not be enforceable by any owner who does not have the same RC registered against his or her land.

Main purpose of the Restrictive Covenants

The main point of our RC will be to prevent lot splitting and the construction of two skinny houses, duplexes, apartment buildings and row houses.

If both you and your neighbour sign on, you can prevent him, her or a new owner from subdividing his or her lot. He or she can do the same for your lot. Bottom line, your neighbour and you will effectively protect each other against future lot splitting.

Two successive meetings on this topic were held on Saturday May 14th at the Rio Terrace Community Hall. Our lawyer, Chris Bowie, described the Restrictive Covenant and answered our questions. Residents of Rio Terrace and of the eastern part of Patricia Heights were informed about this meeting in a mail drop off, and many attended. Many also provided the information the lawyers will require to prepare the final version of the Restrictive Covenants, one for Rio Terrace, and one for Patricia Heights.

Ultimately, all homeowners who have agreed to participate in the Restrictive Covenants will be asked to attend a later meeting to sign the RC in front of our lawyer and a witness. Our lawyer will then register the RC against the title to the property of every participant. That is how any future buyer or owner will have notice that the property is bound by the RC.

COST Legal costs and registration of the Restrictive Covenants will be \$150 per home and will be payable to McAllister LLP in trust at the time you sign the final documentation in front of the lawyer.

Remember that this process is entirely voluntary. You should feel free to consult your own lawyer to have the document reviewed prior to signing. You're reading this days or weeks after the initial evacuation began. What's been happening since then? Are updates still front page news? Are donations of money and materials still needed?

I can't predict the future, sadly, but I hope that we are all still invested in the lives of our fellow Albertans, I really do. I'm certain I won't meet even one half of a percent of the people who've had to come south, fleeing to safety, but I'm nevertheless praying for them all. I've already been moved to tears by the generosity and compassion of people all across our province, offering their homes, their dollars, their kindness and practicality. I cried reading a friend's Facebook update, about her brother going into the danger

Did you miss the meetings? Rio Terrace residents suffered a rude awakening with Lot 5 I and that is not something that we wish for our neighbours of Patricia Heights. City council has been unwavering about lot subdivision and the only way we have found to protect the character of our beautiful neighbourhoods is Restrictive Covenants. The largest possible participation will give us the largest possible protection.

Westbrook residents signed their legal documents (same documents as Rio Terrace and Patricia Heights) on May 7 and we have been advised that 85% of the residents have agreed to participate.

If you were not informed about or unable to come to the information meetings, you can still join the Rio Terrace or the Patricia Heights Restrictive Covenants. Please send an email to protectrio@shaw.ca to receive a blank copy of the Information sheet needed by our lawyer. Your Property Tax Notice will give you the information needed to fill this form, such as the name of the Registered owners, the Plan, the Block and the Lot number. You can leave the completed sheets in Gary Elliott's mailbox, at 15100 Rio Terrace Drive, and he will take the action needed for you to join in the appropriate RC. Gary has agreed to assist the residents of Patricia Heights west in the Restrictive Covenant process. We hope that you will join us if you have not already done so.







Questions About Feeding Backyard

Birds By Dave Cleary of Wild Birds Unlimited

Q: How do I keep the birds coming to my yard? You have your favourite places to eat, whether it's a quick bite or a really nice meal. You trust and rely on them, never considering they might run out of food. Birds are similar. They constantly check their food sources. They may stay and eat a while, grab a quick bite or not eat at all. But, they want to know they can rely on that food source when weather is good or bad or when times are abundant or lean. As much as you enjoy feeding the birds, it's a challenge to tend to the feeders every day. So, it's important to have at least one feeder that does not have to be filled very often. Of course, the birds will return after you refill an empty feeder, but it might take a few days. No matter how many bird feeders you have in your yard, it's important to have one that is the foundation of them all. This foundational feeder should be one that is able to accommodate many birds at one time, such as hopper, tube or cylinder feeders. It should have a quality food that attracts the widest variety of birds like No-Mess Blend or Cylinder foods. It should hold enough food for at least 4 days giving birds a reliable food source, ensuring you'll have more birds to watch! Be sure to place your foundational feeder where it's easy to fill and easy to see. Having a foundational feeder in your yard that never goes empty is key to

Q: When should I put my hummingbird feeder out?

being the birds' favourite restaurant and keep them

coming year-round; bringing you more joy!

The hummers have already started migrating, crossing the Caribbean and heading up through the southern states on their way to western Canada. We can expect to see returning Ruby-throated Hummingbirds by mid-May. It's a good idea to get your feeders filled and ready to put out shortly after May 5 or as soon as possible after that date. The reason to put them out this early is so that the males, who usually arrive before the females, will see your feeder as they begin passing through looking for territories with good food supplies. Most hummingbirds recognize feeders as sources of food as they have either been shown them by their mothers, or have used them on their journey south on migration. It's good to use a feeder that is easy to fill and clean, and one that allows you to see the bird regardless of where it is on the feeder. The nectar they need is easy to prepare, I part granulated white sugar



mixed with 4 parts warm water, to help it dissolve. Don't put coloured dye in the solution as it's unknown how different dyes affect the health of the hummers, and brightly coloured feeders are designed to attract them anyway. Keep some in the fridge to make it easy to refill the feeder.

Q: Can I attract Bluebirds to my yard?

Although Mountain Bluebirds are common in Alberta, unless you live in the countryside it's unlikely you will be able to attract them to your yard. They breed in prairie landscapes and parkland areas, such as those surrounding Edmonton. They will nest in cavities in trees but they are most often seen using bluebird boxes attached to fence posts in rural areas with open fields and trees along the fence lines. If you have suitable land around you, you could consider putting up a few bluebird boxes, especially if your yard is next to open spaces. They begin to arrive in our area in March. The first recorded sighting this year was on March 11th just southeast of Edmonton, perhaps the earliest sighting ever of a Mountain Bluebird in our area. Bluebirds are members of the thrush family. Like Robins (also a thrush), they eat insects and sometimes fruit if snow and cold make insects unavailable. The good news is that you can still see bluebirds by driving along range and township roads from April to July. In the fall they migrate as far south as Mexico. Contact us if you'd like us to send you a map of where to go in Parkland County to find Mountain Bluebirds.

Ready to Read

5 things you can do this summer to instill a love of reading in your children.

We all want our children to love to read. Preparation for literacy begins sooner in a child's development than most parents realize. Setting the stage for our children to be strong readers starts long before they are taught the actual process of reading in school. Here are 5 things that we as parents can do this summer to set them up for success.

- I.Talk to them! By the age of 3, our children have had approximately 15000 hours of time spent learning. They "absorb" their environment through taste, touch, sound, sight and smell. The more we as parents and teachers talk to them, the higher quality of language they develop. While you are out for a walk or bike ride, talk about what you are doing, what you are seeing and what is going on. At the park, get down in the sand with them and chat it up! Fill their lives up with words and language.
- **2. Read with them!** Before they can decode the words on the page, children are learning how to read. They are learning how to turn the page. They are examining pictures and illustrations for clues and context. They are learning we read (in English) from left to right. Take advantage of the lazy summer afternoons and read a story. Allow them to touch, feel and experience books on their own and together with you.
- **3. Play with bubbles!** That is right I said bubbles! First, everyone loves bubbles. Second, tracking and focusing on bubbles as they float through the air helps to develop motor skills kids need in order to become fluent readers. Eye muscles, depth perception, hand-eye coordination (reach-to-pop), and cause and effect are all targeted when kids play with bubbles. Yay for bubbles!




- **4. Bake a cake!** I am not recommending this just because I love cake! Children learn how to interact with text by watching and mimicking us. So, on a rainy summer day, take out a recipe and get to work. Talk to them about the steps as you work through the recipe. Read it out loud and ask questions like "What are we going to do next?". Show them how to refer back to the recipe when you need more information. This teaches about following instructions, organization and finding information. And... you will have something yummy to eat when it is all over.
- 5. Put them to work! For children playing is their job and play is where writing and reading begin. Children who have more real world experiences from interactions and creative play have better language and in turn



develop into better readers. Play groups and play-based preschools (like the ones in our community) are great environments for little ones to expand their world and their language.
