

President, Lance Burns; and spray deck committee co-chair Auriana Burns. There were a few tears shed and much celebration as the enormity of the project has now been completed over three and one half years.

The Spray Deck Committee has completed all work with the fundraising, planning, consulting, construction, and monitoring the initiation of all the spray features. We are still waiting for a few adjustments to some of the sprayers to have them working properly and to their full capacity. If ever you notice something that requires repair or adjustment, please contact the City of Edmonton by dialing 311. The Rio Terrace Community League has turned over all responsibility to the City of Edmonton at the completion of construction and the City of Edmonton will maintain and address any issues at the spray deck.

### Volunteerism





What is volunteerism and what does it mean to you and others in the community. First, let's look at a definition that encapsulates the idea behind the word.

**Voluntarism:** the policy or practice of volunteering one's time or talents for charitable, educational, or other worthwhile activities, especially in one's community. (www.dictionary.com)

My first official act of volunteerism was in 2004 when I and 12 others boarded a bus and headed to one of the most impoverished areas in North America. This was a place called Anapra, which is in the suburbs of Juarez, Mexico. I saw first-hand extreme poverty and squatters living all over the Mesa in dilapidated shacks.

During our visit, we visited the poor and brought food, bedding, and clothing. In other places we painted some building in a compound that served as an orphanage. I put my skills to work and added plumbing for a washroom and an irrigation system for their garden.

I remember how I felt when I returned home and walked in to my house. I had a paradigm shift in my

thinking and thought 'what I have in comparison to those poor people is mind boggling.' I resolved to never complain about my taxes again. I visited that area again with my daughter in 2005. I've since been to El Paso, Nicaragua, Columbia, and Hay River.

While I may have a skill such as plumbing, it was not always used. I did cement work, painting, and removing tile from walls. Anyone willing to offer their time and resources are accepted, there is always something to do.

My wife had a manager retiring from the Alberta government who mentioned that he had always wanted to go on a mission trip. I contacted him and invited him along on our trip in 2005. This was his first trip and he learned, participated and got a bird's eye view of one aspect of volunteerism.

I presently volunteer my time and occasionally my skills as a plumber, jack of all trades as the Maintenance Director at our community hall. The hall is being upgraded but still needs people to volunteer for a host of things. You can find out more on the Rio Terrace website.

One can volunteer at the senior's Centre, animal shelters, the list is endless. You may wish to volunteer somewhere but need some motivation. I quote the NIKE slogan 'Just Do It'.

### Community Soccer for the Indoor Season

### Player Registration is Currently Underway!!

The 2018 -2019 Indoor community level soccer season will begin play in October, but registration for the program is now underway. Players need to be registered by August 31 in order to be assured of being placed on a team.

The 2018 -2019 Indoor community level soccer season will begin play in October, but registration for the program is now underway. Players need to be registered by August 31 in order to be assured of being placed on a team.

There are 5 steps in the on-line registration process:

**Step 1** - Review the Soccer Program information on the Rio Terrace Community League website <a href="https://www.rioterrace.ca/programs/soccer">www.rioterrace.ca/programs/soccer</a>.

**Step 2** - Ensure that you have or obtain a valid (current cards will start with 18-) community league membership. Most likely you will need to purchase a new membership as August 31 is the expiry date of the current memberships. New memberships can be purchased at the Mac Store (7636 – 156 St NW) or online at <a href="www.efcl.org/memberships">www.efcl.org/memberships</a>. You may also purchase your membership directly from the community league by contacting the membership director.

**Step 3** - Complete the actual on-line registration of individual players at <a href="www.emsasoccerportal.com">www.emsasoccerportal.com</a>. When completing the registration for each of your children, please <a href="be sure to specify requesting to play">be sure to specify requesting to play</a> on a Rio Terrace team, and indicate 'play with' requests for friends and/or coaches. If you have not previously registered any family members for soccer

using this website, you will first have to complete a family account set-up and then proceed with registering individual players. Please also be sure to indicate any parental help available for coaching, etc.

**Step 4** – Pay the EMSAWEST registration fee either on-line or in-person to the EMSAWEST office (15430 – 93 Ave NW). Please check on the EMSAWEST.com website to confirm hours that the office is open to receive your payment. Please note that player registration is not complete until the payment of the registration fees has been completed.

**Step 5** – Make payment to Rio Terrace Community League of the individual Indoor season player fee and the uniform deposit. Rio Terrace charges a player fee for players on teams that are U9 aged and older for the Indoor season of \$60 per player to cover Soccer Program costs incurred by Rio Terrace. A uniform deposit (cheque post-dated to Feb 28, 2019) of \$30 for U9 through U13 and \$60 for U15 through U19 is also payable – this will be cashed only if the jerseys supplied by Rio Terrace are not returned at the end of the season.

A date for paying the Rio Terrace individual indoor season player fee and the uniform deposits will be arranged for the latter part of Sept. The parents of all players registered for the program will be notified by email of this payment date once it has been set.

The Indoor teams will be formed in September and play will commence in mid-October. <u>Players registering after August 31 will only be added to a team if the team is in need of more players, so please be sure to complete the registration of your child before the end of August.</u>

### Generally Speaking – Making an Effort in Pronouncing Names Right

In some ways, I feel lucky. Even though I have immigrated from another country, most people have an easy time pronouncing my name. As it turns out, Giselle is a name of a European origin, so for those who are English-speakers, it's a piece of cake. I'm even double-lucky with my last name. It's difficult to mispronounce the word 'general' since it is in the English language.

There are so many people though that are not so lucky.

I personally squirm every time I stumble upon an unfamiliar name, feeling unsure on where the syllables start and stop, and confused on which ones are the silent letters. It does not feel like a warm or welcoming first impression.

During a dinner gathering for the board members, a story shared by our president – who is a high school teacher – stood out to me. There was a student with the name Fatima, which he has been pronouncing a certain way. Until one day he was corrected by another student that it should be pronounced in a way where emphasis is on a different syllable. He asked the student why she didn't correct him. She said that it's not a big deal, to which he disagreed. I really appreciated that perspective from an educator.

It reminded me of the first time I volunteered in an elementary school here in Edmonton to teach a topic related to business. The child's name was not even that unusual in my opinion, Michaela. But given where I immigrated from I do realize that I pronounce some words differently.

I practiced learning to pronounce all the names in the class list before my first session. I came to class and said her name she beamed and said, 'wow Miss General, you said my name right!' This continued in other sessions that I did in other schools. Children make a big deal of a person or volunteer knowing their name, and even more so if it is said properly.

When my spouse and I are vacationing in the Philippines, it was not a surprise that my relatives were curious, wanting to know what his last name was. We told them what it was, and they were so confused that he even took out his driver's license ID so they can see how it is spelled. My bet is that my relatives have never heard of a Polish last name before, so some of them were so afraid of messing it up they didn't even bother trying to say it. I honestly don't know what is more rude.

A person's name is a significant part of who they are. Given that we are in a multicultural community, it is valuable to master a few techniques to limit the confusion and awkwardness about this. This includes not assuming someone's gender based on the name, listening attentively when the person takes the time to teach the proper pronunciation, and remembering the name in the first place. It's something I wasn't told immediately upon landing in this country, but something that I realize now is incredibly important. I hope that this can encourage us to make better efforts in doing it well, instead of awkwardly laughing and saying 'oh I'm sure I'll mess it up anyway'.

The Southwest leg of Anthony Henday Drive surpassed capacity in 2009. The original design projected 40,000 vehicles per day by the year 2020. Today, approximately 80,000 vehicles per day travel along that stretch of the Henday which is why we are expanding it from four to six lanes; when construction begins we anticipate the widening project will take three years to complete.

Switching gears, I'd like to tell you about an incredible honour it was to present Alberta's first formal declaration of Global Day of Inclusion on July 21, on behalf of the government, to a Special Olympics athlete on the 50th anniversary of Special Olympics. We value inclusion and accessibility for all and remain committed to initiatives that support these values in our province.

Making life more affordable for everyday Albertans is also important to us. The cost of quality child care has been ignored in Alberta for far too long. A government that is focused on families' priorities can't ignore a challenge that so many families face. I was pleased that our NDP government's \$25/day child care pilot program selected the YMCA Jamie Platz child care centre as one of its locations, with its 48 existing spaces.

We're also supporting our students, through our Summer Temporary Employment Program (STEP) by helping them connect to employers so they can gain the skills and work experience they need to get good jobs this summer. Here in Edmonton-McClung we are lucky to have four STEP employers: South Jasper Place Minor Baseball Association; Lois Hole Library; Chabad Lubavitch; and Jamie Platz YMCA.

As a government, we remain committed to ongoing, meaningful, and respectful relationships with the Indigenous Peoples of Alberta especially the In-

digenous youth of our province.

I am incredibly honoured this year's Alberta Indigenous Games will be hosted in Callingwood. These games empower youth and give them opportunities to be future leaders in their communities. I look forward to co-sponsoring the round dance festival with my NDP caucus colleague, Dr. Bob Turner, MLA for Edmonton-Whitemud this year and we hope to see you at the events planned during the August 15-19 competition.

### Questions About Feeding Wild Birds

### Q: Do we get hummingbirds in Edmonton?

YES!!! August is a peak month for seeing Rubythroated Hummingbirds in Edmonton! Although hummingbirds can be relatively hard to attract in the city, they do pass through during migration. For that reason, August is a good month to take a chance on putting a hummingbird feeder out.

Sightings of Ruby-throated Hummingbirds spike in August due to the post-fledging maturity of this year's new hummingbirds and the need of all migrating hummingbirds to fuel up for the long trip to Central America.

Placing a hummingbird feeder near flowers such as Nesturtiums and flowers with tubular wells such as lilies, and bee balm increases the chance of hummingbirds noticing the feeder.

Once noticed, that fueling up for their incredibly long migratory journey will be all the easier for these beautiful little birds. They'll likely stay for a few days to get their fill! Hummingbird nectar is a 4:1 ratio of water and sugar. It can go off over time so changing it every week to ten days, if in direct sunlight, is recommended.

### Q: If we feed birds in summer, does it make them dependent on feeders?

No! The concern people have that fuels the question is whether or not birds lose the ability to forage and find food sources themselves if humans are providing seeds, nuts, suet, berries, millet, corn, grubs, and so on via the large range of feeders available.

The great news is that birds who access feeders put out by humans still acquire a minimum of 75% of their food from their own foraging and natural food seeking instincts. Feeding the birds doesn't hinder their ability to find food beyond a feeder environment. So don't hesitate to feed the birds year round! Enjoy seeing them in your yard!

### Q: How can I keep my bird food fresh in warm weather?

As suet is made from beef fat, extreme heat can cause some suet blends to melt. No Melt suets are available in a number of varieties. This suet is rendered multiple times to prolong its freshness and has a small amount of cornmeal added to help prevent melt, even in direct sun.

With summertime heat and rain, we recommend filling your feeder with a supply of bird food that lasts 2-3 days to avoid this problem. If feed sits in the sun or indirect heat for many days, the chance of it spoiling increases. With a 2-3-day supply of feed for your feathered friends you not only ensure the feed does not spoil but also makes it easy to have the opportunity for regular cleaning of your

#### feeder!

Like us, birds can get ill. As multiple birds feed at feeders, it's important to clean feeders on a regular basis to minimize the possibility of transmission of disease.

I was personally surprised by the usefulness of 311. If you ever need to contact the city regarding an issue or a question I would recommend giving 311 a try.

The RIO TERRACE COMMUNITY LEAGUE will be holding their Annual General Meeting on September 27 at 7 PM at the community hall. Elections will he help for the following positions. Term of office is two years. A general description of the positions is listed below:

The Vice President shall act in the capacity of the President at the request, or in the absence, of the President. They are responsible for managing casino activities, reviewing Bylaws, Policies, and Procedures, and are a signing officer of the League.

The Treasurer shall receive all monies paid to the society and be responsible for the deposit of same in the League bank accounts. They shall properly account for the funds of the League and keep such books as may be directed. The Treasurer will recommend, in conjunction with the President, an Annual Budget to the Board of Directors. They shall present a full detailed account of receipts and disbursements to the Board whenever requested and shall prepare for submission to the Annual General Meeting a statement outlining a financial review of the previous fiscal year. The Treasurer is a signing officer of the League.

Up to 10 Directors at Large may be appointed to the Board at any time. Directors at Large will perform duties as assigned by the Board.
