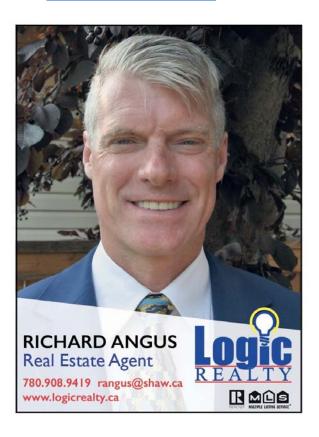

2023 Outdoor Community Soccer Registration

Registration for the 2023 Outdoor Community soccer season is now underway and continues through to March 12, 2023. Player registration is completed online using the EMSA West soccer portal for player registration and payment needs to be completed by March 12 to ensure placement on a team. Late registrants may find themselves unable to be placed on the team or community that they have requested. The Outdoor season is expected to start on Monday May 1 (weather and field conditions permitting) and runs through to the end June. City Championships take place the first week of July with the possibility of one further weekend of play in mid July if a team qualifies for further playoffs.

The 2023 Rio Terrace Community Outdoor soccer program is for players born in years from 2004 through 2019. Players born in 2004 through 2015 will play on community-based teams participating in the EMSA /EMSA West community soccer programs. These Rio Terrace based teams will generally play twice a week and practice once a week. Teams in the U9 age group will play their games only in the west end of Edmonton (with possibly a few games in Spruce Grove). Teams playing in the older age groups of U11 through U19 can expect to play their games throughout Edmonton.

Rio Terrace runs an in-house soccer program for the players born in years 2016 through 2019. The combined U4/U5 as well as the U7 FunSoccer programs feature a focus on fun activities, drills and short games that promote fun and active learning and player

skill development. These programs take place at the Rio Terrace School field on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 6:15 PM to 7:15 PM. Expected start date is May 8 and we will be done on June 21. Lots of parental support and involvement are required for these age groups, so we need parents to volunteer and sign-up to help out and participate in the fun.

How to Register

Player registration for all age groups of community soccer takes place on-line using the soccer portal on the EMSA WEST soccer website. https://emsawest.com/play/register/outdoor-registration

Player Registration steps that need to be completed are:

First step is to obtain / have a valid
Community League membership. Current
Community League memberships are
numbered 22-XXXXX and are valid through
Aug 31, 2023. A membership from any
community in Edmonton is valid for soccer
registration at Rio Terrace. Those needing to
purchase a Community membership can do
so most easily through an on-line purchase at
the EFCL website.

Second step is to use the EMSA West soccer portal to register players individually for the coming outdoor season. Please be sure to complete all of the registration steps, indicate that the player wishes to play on a Rio Terrace team (or other if that is the case) and identify any coach or friend to play with requests. Please be sure to identify if you are able to volunteer as a coach or manager for your child's team - lack of coaches is a prime reason for not having teams for kids to play on.



How to Pay for Player Registration

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Sticking to the Point: When It Comes to Health, There Is No "One-Size-Fits-All"

We live in an age where the public has unprecedented access to herbal ingredients, supplements, health foods, and other natural remedies. Supergreen powders like chlorella, spirulina, and moringa added to smoothies can help to clear inflammation if used properly, however in excess, they can be the culprit for many digestive issues like bloating and diarrhea. Unfortunately, when it comes to foods, herbs, and lifestyle trends, there is no "one-size-fits-all" solution. So what is the alternative? This is where holistic systems of healing step in. Traditional

While they may benefit many people, they aren't necessarily beneficial to everyone. This is why visiting a local herbalist is much more fruitful if you're hoping to take a more natural approach to healing. Chinese Medical Herbalism excels at tailoring herbal formulas to suit each patient's specific needs. Rather than using high doses of a single ingredient like Ginseng for fatigue, it combines anywhere from 4-10+ herbal ingredients to moderate harsh effects and leads to a more balanced response. The supplement industry provides access to a wide range of herbal ingredients and natural remedies that we wouldn't have been able to obtain historically. Still, it is essential to remember that not all ingredients out there are suitable for your body.

New Guide on Big Lake Mammals, Reptiles, and Amphibians

Nature fans can now learn all about the moose, mice, and wolverines of Big Lake through a just-released guide to the animals of Lois Hole Park. The Big Lake Environment Support Society's Animal Guide to Lois Hole Centennial Provincial Park is available for purchase and in a free digital version.

The guide contains photos and information on 53 mammals, reptiles, and amphibians found in and around Lois Hole Park based on local knowledge and scientific research. The guide covers salamanders, toads, frogs, and snakes around Big Lake, said co-author Lyn Druett. These species tend to be elusive, and park visitors were more likely to hear than see them.

Guide co-author Linda Brain said researching the animals of Big Lake left her awestruck. The muskrat has two-to-three litters of sixto-eight young a year and serves as a food source for many predators. Big Lake was also likely home to thirteen-lined ground squirrels, which breathe once every five minutes during hibernation, and pygmy shrews, which eat three times their body weight every day.

Perhaps the most surprising entry in the guide is the wolverine, a ferocious, brown, stocky, dog-like creature that has been spotted just twice around Lois Hole Park in the last 10 years. Purchase and free digital version information

Encouraging Kids to Help in the Kitchen

When the entire family gets involved in the kitchen, it can encourage connections and quality time. Kids can take part in the process, from planning meals to cleaning up. It can take extra time and effort in the beginning but it will become easier over time as kids learn skills. Being a part of planning and preparing meals teaches kids skills they can use throughout their lives.

Here are some age-appropriate tips on encouraging children to become involved in the kitchen:

Plan meals. Even very young children can assist with planning meals.

- Talk about food safety. Remind children to wash their hands often when cooking and before eating the meal. You may also want to speak about keeping cold foods cold and hot foods hot.
- Give younger children options for a meal and have them choose which one they would like to help with or eat.
- Work together to discover what ingredients you already have on hand, and what ingredients you may need to purchase.
- Have school-aged children help find items in the store.
- Older children and teens may be able to choose recipes and create shopping lists on their own. As an extra challenge, give them a budget to follow when planning the meal.

Preparing meals:

- Young children can help count ingredients, add ingredients to bowls, stir and help wash vegetables and fruit.
- School-aged children can help assemble simple dishes and measure or mix ingredients.
- Older children and teens can use basic equipment with supervision and follow recipes.
- Try meals that each member of the family can customize. Try personal pizzas, omelettes or wraps and have each person choose their own toppings and ingredients.

Eating:

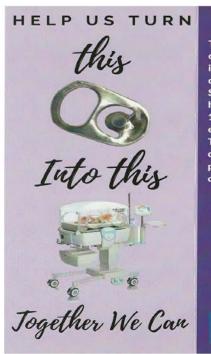
- Have a conversation together during mealtimes. Consider sharing about your day.
- Take turns setting the table.
- Everyone can share what their favourite part of the meal was or what they did to help prepare.
- Talk about what meal you want to make next.

Cleaning up:

- Everyone can have a clean-up task.
- Young children can help wipe surfaces and bring their own dishes to the counter or to the dishwasher.
- School aged children can help put leftovers into containers and dirty dishes on the counter or load them into the dishwasher.
- Older children and teens can clear the table, clean dirty dishes, or put away clean dishes.

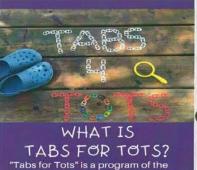

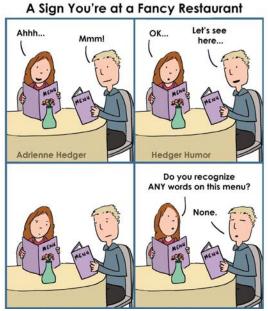
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Poop Happens!

Well, poop happens! Especially if you're a pet owner. Have you ever been out for a walk and, at the moment your dog is 'doing its business', realized your pockets are empty - the poop bags were left at home! Yikes! With COVID, the City of Edmonton was not regularly filling the pet waste bag stations at Patricia Ravine. Thank you to the Pet Waste Angels that often left poop bags available at the ravine entrances as well as the homes throughout the neighbourhood that have pet waste bags on their little libraries or fence posts. Kindness and pitching in to support each other keeps our neighbourhood clean and safe for pets and people.

A little over a year ago, a couple of engaged community members, Perry Wynn and Auriana Burns, spent time investigating how we could support our local businesses, residents and pets. They brought a proposal to the community league board regarding poop bag stands around the neighbourhood to help combat abandoned poop! This will allow owners to ensure that they have a bag when they need one. There will soon be waste bag dispensers available in strategic parts of Patricia Heights, Rio Terrace and Quesnell so that when you are out with your pet, you will be able to grab a bag. The dispensers provide a small space for advertising a local business, a community message, or a kind thought!

Over the next few weeks, Perry and Auriana will be approaching residents in strategic areas inviting them to be part of this project by mounting a pet waste bag dispenser and sign on their fence.



Here is a photo of the bag dispensers that you may see when you are out for a walk through the neighbourhood.

Residents who volunteer to have a dispenser and sign would be supported by the community league to ensure that the dispensers are always full and accessible. A donation from businesses to support this initiative will allow free advertising on a dispenser for a determined period of time.

If you own a pet, you know what a difference it makes to your life and lifestyle. Having a pet also impacts your neighbours and your interactions with other community residents. Owning a pet includes responsibilities that support our neighbours and keep our neighbourhood clean enough to be outdoors.
