



This is just one of the stories you'll hear. Jeannette Flannagan's story as told to Gale Arneson:

It was 1964, when a young couple by the name of Flannagan moved into the beautiful neighbourhood of Rio Terrace. Jim was a firefighter with Jasper Place (because Jasper Place paid more money than the city of Edmonton); and Jeannette at the time, was a stay-at-home mom, with their two-and-a-half-year-old toddler, Patrick.

Jeannette had never heard of this place called Rio Terrace, until she went to work at the Parade of Homes showcase on 75th Avenue and she learned about Rio. Although there were only five homes being shown; all five homes were different and unique and fit different income levels. So, soon all the homes sold out like wildfire.

Just looking at these new home really excited Jeannette. She and Jim had been living in a small basement apartment in Jasper Place; because the rule was, that to work in Jasper Place, you had to live in JP. But there were no

additional homes to buy. So that was a disappointment.

Soon Jeannette took to driving around Rio Terrace everyday looking to see if any houses had come on the market. One day, lo and behold, a house had come up for sale, as an Imperial Oil employee was moving to Calgary. The Flannagan's immediately snatched up the house for the exorbitant price of \$14,000.

As soon as they moved in Jeannette busied herself with interior decorating. First off, they installed a moss green carpet in the livingroom. Then at a store called the "House of Modern" they purchased a pure wool brown sofa; with two complimentary matching gold chairs. Jeannette, then imported orange fabric from Sweden and had drapes made.

It was also in 1964, that Jasper Place merged with the city of Edmonton. Originally, people coming home to Rio Terrace had to come down 149 Street through a ravine because the Whitemud wasn't there. But once the Whitemud was built, two new streets emerged, as 156 and 159 streets, along with two new bridges right over the Whitemud.

In 1968, Jeannette and Jim had a daughter who they called Robin. Robin was born with a hole in her heart and at first there was not much hope for her. But the miracle baby survived and grew to be a healthy young woman, who ended up being the bat catcher on an all-boys softball team. Both Flannagan children, Patrick and Robin attended Rio Terrace School which must have been a high-profile school back then, as it was the only school in Edmonton to offer French Immersion. But French Immersion did not start until grade four; so, it was Robin and



some of the other grade four students that broke the ice into French Immersion.

Jeannette has now lived in her beautiful home in Rio Terrace for fifty-nine years. For many years Jeannette worked for Imperial Oil. And she has loved travelling to different parts of the world and wintering in Palm Springs. Today she tends her yard and enjoys gardening. She's also a prolific reader and enjoys good music.







I will definitely try to eat those new granola bars I hate... And so, when we first moved to Rio Terrace in 2019, one of the first things I did was search for a local Buy Nothing group. Having had a Buy Nothing group in my Ottawa neighbourhood, I was looking forward to finding one here and connecting with neighbours, and so I was totally thrilled when Joanne started this one.

The Buy Nothing group is such a fantastic thing in so many ways. Through this group, I've met so many neighbours I otherwise likely wouldn't have even crossed paths with. It's such a good feeling to have that connection with people and with the community around us. I think this is my number one reason for loving the Buy Nothing group - all these small connections made through simple ways of helping each other add up to a network of connectedness that has totally transformed the way I feel living in this neighbourhood, and it's great.

That community network is a great place to go to ask for or share advice and to lend/borrow handy things. I recently avoided spending a pile of money on a multimeter we needed for one day, just by asking on the Buy Nothing group if anyone had one we could borrow (thanks, Kara!).

As a new mom, I've also benefited tremendously from the gifts others have shared via the group. I can't even list all the things that have been passed on to us for our new baby, but some of my favourites include clothes galore (between gifts from friends and family and the buy nothing group, we haven't yet needed to buy our baby any new clothing), a high chair and swing chair (both of which we ended up not needing and passed on), and, my favourite Buy Nothing nursery gift, a beautiful CRIB! Wow!

At the same time, it also makes it easier for me to not worry so much about that thing we're buying that our 8 month old is going to outgrow in about five minutes...that blue dinosaur Halloween costume that will be useless for us after this year? No problem! Someone else in the neighbourhood can use it next year! This has also been a great way to connect with other parents with young children and/or parents who are expecting!

Of course, it's not just baby stuff. We've been able to share loads of things - everything from bigger household items to posts of "we bought too much spinach - anyone want some?" - it's all fair game, and everything we save from being wasted feels like a win to me. What is Process Focused Tarot Reading?

When you think of a Tarot card reading, you might imagine a dark room, thick with incense, a crystal ball before you, and a mysterious woman telling your future. Yes, for some people, that's what Tarot is. Not for me.

I first learned about the term processfocused or process-oriented Tarot reading from Jessica Dore, a Tarot reader and teacher whose first book, Tarot for Change, just hit the shelves. Her approach is so much more intuitive than I had often seen when I was trying to leaf through guidebooks and memorize the meaning of each card. She offers Tarot the way I had already been reading it: by observing the images of each card and noticing what comes up. Sure, I had wanted my Tarot cards to tell me the future, but the more I worked with them, the more I discovered they really just don't work like that. In her book, Dore refers to each of the cards as "secrets," each archetype holding not so much answers but questions to help guide us on a path that is meaningful, if not linear. She writes,

"Tarot, as you'll see if you have not already, provides a path toward reclaiming the imagination from the grips of doubt and rationalism. Towards reawakening the part of us with the audacity to know without material evidence."

When I read Tarot—or, I should say, when my client and I read Tarot together, we collaborate on exploring the problem or question that the client came in with. We talk about it and feel around it. Before I say anything about what the cards "mean," I



want to know what the image feels like for you. What details do you notice? What story do you begin to tell about the card in your mind?

One of the reasons I am drawn to Jessica Dore is that she makes an explicit parallel between Tarot and psychology. The secrets contained within the cards are much like the secrets in our dreams, in the places we hold in our bodies. They reveal something about the world we are living in that we haven't been able to consciously acknowledge. They are telling secrets about our deepest truths that we cannot face on our own. Together, we witness these unacknowledged truths coming forward.

If you are feeling disconnected from yourself and your intuition, if you are feeling lost or confused or having trouble seeing where you next want to go, process-focused Tarot might be able to help you. It won't tell your future or give you the answers, necessarily, though clarity may certainly be on the menu. But it will give you questions that will help you access your intuition, your erotic energy, the power that you already possess within you. It will help you find your path.



Protecting Yourself and Your Family From Illness

This fall, and always, reducing the spread of illness remains top of mind around Alberta.

Staying home when sick and practicing proper respiratory etiquette and hand hygiene are important. In addition, your single most effective means of protection is prevention through immunization.

Influenza and COVID-19 immunizations help Albertans stay healthy, protect others and reduce pressure on Alberta's health-care system. Learn more at ahs.ca/immunize.

Here are a few quick facts to support your immunization decision making.

You cannot get the disease from a vaccine.

Most vaccines are inactivated vaccines. This means they have no living bacteria or viruses in them, so they cannot cause disease.

Some of the vaccines for <u>COVID-19</u> are mRNA vaccines. These types of vaccines also do not contain any living bacteria or viruses and cannot cause disease.

Some vaccines, such as vaccines that protect against <u>measles</u>, <u>mumps</u>, <u>rubella</u>, <u>varicella</u> (<u>chickenpox</u>), or <u>rotavirus</u>, have weakened forms of these viruses. These are called live vaccines, but also do not contain enough virus to transmit disease through immunization.

Your healthcare provider will always ask you questions about your health and medicines before you get a vaccine to make sure the vaccine is safe for you.

Healthy diet and lifestyle are not enough to protect against infectious diseases.

A healthy diet and lifestyle are important for overall health, but they do not provide direct immunity against the diseases that vaccines can prevent.

Without immunization, your body will not have specific antibodies to fight off vaccine-preventable diseases. No matter how healthy your diet or lifestyle, without immunization, you are at risk for serious diseases. You are also more likely to spread these diseases to others.

Most vaccines protect 90 per cent to 100 per cent of children who get their recommended doses. Without immunization, your child is facing possibly diseases without protection. Getting your child immunized at the right ages and the right times is the best way to protect them from serious disease.

Homeopathic or naturopathic nosodes do not protect you from diseases.

Homeopathic or naturopathic solutions, often called "nosodes," are sometimes marketed as vaccines or immunizations. But they do not replace immunizations.

Health Canada has not approved nosodes as vaccines. Nosodes are not tested or monitored for safety the same way that vaccines are. All vaccines in Canada are carefully <u>tested and continually monitored for safety</u>.

New Name Proposed for Oliver Neighbourhood

Robyn Paches, the president of the Oliver Community League, confirmed that an agreement has been reached on a new name, but it has yet to be made public. The Naming Circle is working on a way to work with Indigenous leaders to make a "respectful" announcement.

The neighbourhood was named for Frank Oliver, the former Liberal politician and newspaperman who championed many racist views. He supported legislation that restricted immigration based on ethnicity, and championed regulations that restricted the movement of Indigenous peoples.

The Oliver name has been a contentious issue for several years, as more and more people learned about his time as both a writer and political leader. A Naming Circle was created to take in community input on how the community should move forward.

Members of the City's Naming Committee lauded the Oliver process. The Urban Planning Committee was told that the way the Oliver community decided on the new name is a blueprint for how other neighbourhoods should undertake these processes going forward. https://urbanaffairs.ca/edmontonish/oliver-no-more/
